Literacy and Visual Literacy - Jen Wheeler, Art Faculty, DCC

This two day workshop focuses on learning and analyzing the different story-telling considerations through the use of visuals. Using excerpts of graphic novels (novels told in comic book style) as a base, we will explore how placement, shifting imagery, color, and panel arrangement/pagination influences content and meaning. We will use portions/pages from several sources ranging from K-12 levels. Through class discussion we will discover the different considerations for content depending upon grade/age levels.

## 1:00 to 4:30 p.m.

Visual Literacy and Sequential Art - Jen Wheeler, Art Faculty, DCC

In this two day hands-on workshop, educators will experiment with making illustrated panels to convey sequencing and emotion. As a springboard to making our own panels, we will first explore the different ways stories are told through visual sequences. We will learn how tension, cliffhangers, and story pacing are built into sequential art. By examining how authors of graphic novels (novels told in comic-strip format) use visual formats, we will then create our own simple panels to show sequence. This workshop is appropriate for K-12 levels.
